History

Carousel was the second collaboration of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II (Oklahoma was the first). It premiered at the Majestic Theatre in New York City on April 19, 1945 and ran for 890 performances. The production was groundbreaking in many ways. It was the first musical ever to have a tragic storyline. It was also the first musical to begin without an overture. ("The Carousel Waltz" was a ten-minute mime sequence in which the characters were introduced.) The show was also unique in that it, like many other Rodgers and Hammerstein productions, included a ballet that was critical to the plot. The show's message is a dramatic testimony to the power of faith, hope and love. It is easy to understand why, of all the shows they created, Carousel was Rodgers and Hammerstein's favorite.

Justin L. Addington (Musical Director): Justin has served as Director of Music and Worship for Skidaway Island United Methodist Church since June of 2010. Prior to coming to SIUMC, Justin maintained an active career in community and professional theatre, having appeared with Spartanburg Little Theatre, Spartanburg Youth Theatre, Spartanburg Repertory Company, Gaffney Little Theatre, USCS Shoestring Players, Theatre Converse, Limestone College, and Greer Children's Theatre. Favorite roles include: Jack in Into the Woods, Motel in Fiddler on the Roof, Wayne in State Fair, Lumiere in Beauty and the Beast, the Prince in Cinderella, Tommy in Brigadoon, and Faain in Oliver, Justin has also served as Musical Director and played piano in the orchestra for Guys and Dolls. Cats, My Fair Lady, Annie, Fiddler on the Roof, Thoroughly Modern Millie and Cabaret. From 2003-2009 Justin also served as staff Music Director for the professional traveling troupe Downstage Centre. Justin received a bachelor's degree in Music Education and graduated with honors from Limestone College in Gaffney, South Carolina. He is currently pursuing a master's degree in Sacred Music from Concordia University.

Suzanne Prior (Stage Director): Lucky enough to have been influenced by two very musical grandmothers, Sue has devoted her entire life to many forms of musical expression. She studied Classical Vocal Music at Skidmore College and became a classroom teacher of music and theater through araduate studies at Manhattanville College. While husband, Dick, was serving in the military, Sue deviated from her artistic life to become an adoption social worker for three years in Baltimore, Maryland. Upon returning to New York, she became a member of the Robert Shaw Collegiate Chorale (1964-2000), Founder/Director of the Irvington Children's Theatre (1976-2000), Founder/Director of The Quoque Junior Theatre Troupe (1979-Present), Soprano Soloist, Irvington Presbyterian Church (20 years), Choir Director, St. Joseph's Church (12 years) and was the Director of The Song Pipers (15 years), a women's musical therapy singing group. After retiring to Savannah in 2000, Sue remained active by founding The Notables, another women's musical therapy group (2000-2010), participating in the Savannah Philharmonic Chorus, the SIUMC Chancel Choir (acting twice as the interim choir director) and tutoring math and reading at Hesse Elementary School. Sue thanks her very patient husband, Dick, her three grown children and her five active grandchildren for filling her life with such joy and excitement. Mornings spent in competition on the tennis court help to keep everything else in check.

Richard Rodgers and **Oscar Hammerstein II** (Composer and Lyricist): Rodgers and Hammerstein were an influential, innovative and successful American musical theatre writing team. They created a string of popular Broadway musicals in the 1940s and 1950s, initiating what is considered the "golden age" of musical theatre. Their shows *Oklahoma!*, Carousel, South Pacific, The King and I, State Fair, Flower Drum Song and The Sound of Music, were outstanding successes. Among the many accolades they garnered were thirty-four Tony Awards, fifteen Academy Awards, two Grammy Awards and the Pulitzer Prize.



Zach Blaylock (Jigger): Zach is a junior at Armstrong Atlantic State University, currently pursuing a degree in History in hopes of teaching one day. He has been a part of the theatre community since 2007 working backstage/tech for such shows as The Diary of Anne Frank, Les Miserables, Hairspray, and No Exit. He has most recently become a charter member of The Collective Face Theatre Ensemble. A few of his favorite roles include the title role in Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, Nickolas Beckett in What the Butler Saw, and playing Cinderella's Prince/ The Wolf/ The Baker's Baby in Into the Woods.



Tom Nichols (Starkeeper/Dr. Seldon): Tom is an ordained United Methodist clergyman with 41 years of ministerial experience, including 22 years as an Active Duty Navy Chaplain. He retired from the Navy in 2004 following a three-year assignment as the Director of Religious Ministries for the Navy's Southeastern Region, which included Guantanamo Bay, Cuba during the establishment of the Terrorist Detention Facility in 2002. He served as a Chaplain to Marines at both the First Marine Division in California and the Second Marine Division in North Carolina. Other tours of duty included

Naval Support Activity, Naples, Italy and various assignments in Virginia, Florida and on the Island of Guam. Tom has been on the Skidaway Island UMC Staff as the Associate Pastor for two years. He holds a bachelor's degree in History from Armstrong Atlantic State University, and both the Master of Divinity and Master of Theology from Candler School of Theology, Emory University. Tom and his wife, JoAnn have been married 43 years. They have three children and fourteen grandchildren. Tom and JoAnn both grew up in the Savannah area and are enjoying getting re-acquainted with their native city.



Katie-Wimberly Smyth (Louise): Katie-Wimberly is a freshman in the honors program at Jenkins High School. She acted the musical Quilters at six months of age and has enjoyed the theatre ever since! She has been a part of the theatre community in North Georgia, performing in Music Man, The Sound of Music, and Cinderella. She was a member of Grand Illusion at Rome Middle School, an audition show choir. In addition to singing and acting, she began dance at three years old with Rome Civic Ballet. Her ballet credits include The Nutcracker and The Nativity. She currently dances in the troupe with

Madeleine Walker Coastal Ballet in Savannah. Having just moved to Savannah six months ago, she is thrilled for the opportunity to be a part of this talented cast in Carousel!

Synopsis of the Play

The time is 1873. The place, a small fishing village on the rocky New England coastline. Billy Bigelow, the handsome and swaggering barker for Mrs. Mullin's carousel, meets Julie Jordan, a lovely young working girl at the nearby mill. Billy and Julie fall in love and are soon married. Julie's friend, Carrie Pipperidge is also about to be married to her love, Mr. Enoch Snow.

Billy loses his job and becomes sullen and difficult, raging bitterly and bullying his wife — until Julie quietly informs Billy that he is about to become a father. During this time, Billy and Julie are living with Julie's cousin, Nettie Fowler, who owns a seaside spa.

Desperately anxious to provide for the coming child, Billy is persuaded by Jigger Craigin, a shiftless sailor, to take part in a hold up. The robbery attempt is thwarted; Jigger escapes, but Billy is caught. Cornered, disgraced and terrified, Billy kills himself. Julie arrives on the scene and cradles Billy as he dies in her arms. He is sent 'up there' and meets the Starkeeper.

Billy is allowed to return to earth for one day fifteen years later, and he encounters the daughter (Louise) he never knew. She is a lonely, friendless teenager, her father's reputation as a thief and bully having haunted her throughout her young life.

He attends the child's high school graduation and observes the daughter's doubts and insecurities. Spiritually, he reaches out to her and encourages her to believe in herself. Then, turning to Julie, he whispers "I Love You" and is taken to his heavenly reward.

Michelle Evans Jarrell (Julie): Michelle recently garnered praise for her performance as a quarterfinalist in the 2011 American Traditions Competition in Savannah. Evan Goetz (Billy): Evan is a second-year MFA candidate in Performing Arts at Savannah College of Art and Design (SCAD). He has worked with theatrical organizations such as Serenbe Playhouse, SCAD, Limestone College, Gaffney Little Theatre, and Carolina Actors Studio Theatre. Favorite roles include: Paul in Barefoot in the Park, Lefou in Beauty and the Beast, Ernst in Spring Awakening, Don John in Much Ado About Nothing, and Gideon in Seven Brides for Seven Brothers.
