



THE FIRST LESSON - 1 Kings 8:22-30 (Read by the Lay Reader)

Then Solomon stood before the altar of the Lord in the presence of the whole assembly of Israel and spread out his hands to heaven. He said, "O Lord, God of Israel, there is no God like you in heaven above or on earth beneath, keeping covenant and steadfast love with your servants who walk before you with all their heart, the covenant that you kept for your servant my father David as you declared to him; you promised with your mouth and have this day fulfilled with your hand. Therefore, O Lord, God of Israel, keep for your servant my father David that which you promised him, saying, 'There shall never fail you a successor before me to sit on the throne of Israel, if only your children look to their way, to walk before me as you have walked before me.' Therefore, O God of Israel, let your word be confirmed that you promised to your servant my father David. "But will God indeed dwell on the earth? THE MAGNIFICAT (Sung by the Choir)

The Magnificat is the Blessed Virgin Mary's song of thanksgiving in response to the fact that she will bear the Son of God, fulfilling the promises of the Old Testament.

THE SECOND LESSON - Matthew 16:13-20 (Read by the Officiant)

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say John the Baptist but others Elijah and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

THE NUNC DIMITTIS (Sung by the Choir)

The Nunc Dimittis is the song of the aged Simeon, who had been promised by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he had seen the Messiah. Upon taking the infant Jesus into his arms, Simeon utters these words of thanksgiving.

THE APOSTLES' CREED (Spoken by All)

The Apostles' Creed grew from Trinitarian statements of belief made by early Christians at their baptism.

I believe in God, the Father almighty,

Maker of heaven and earth;

And in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord;

Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit,

Born of the Virgin Mary,

Suffered under Pontius Pilate,

Was crucified, dead, and buried;

The third day he rose from the dead;

He ascended into heaven,

And sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty;

From thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit,

The holy catholic Church,

The communion of saints,

The forgiveness of sins,

The resurrection of the body,

And the life everlasting. Amen.

THE LESSER LITANY (Read Responsively)

THE LORD'S PRAYER (Spoken by All)

Our Father, who art in heaven,
Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come, thy will be done,
On earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.

As we forgive those who sin against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
But deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom,

THE SUFFRAGES (Read Responsively)

Officiant: O Lord, show thy mercy upon us:

People: And grant us thy salvation.

Officiant: O Lord, save the State.

People: And mercifully hear us when we call upon thee.

Officiant: Endue thy ministers with righteousness: **People:** And make thy chosen people joyful.

Officiant: O Lord, save thy people: **People:** And bless thine inheritance.

Officiant: Give peace in our time, O Lord:

People: Because there is none other that fighteth for us,

but only thou, O God.

Officiant: O God, make clean hearts within us: **People:** And take not thy Holy Spirit from us.

THE COLLECTS (Intoned by the Officiant)

Three short prayers are offered which 'collect' our thoughts. The first honors the day of celebration, the second is a prayer for peace, and the third is a prayer against peril.

Almighty God, to whose glory we celebrate the anniversary of this house of prayer:
We give you thanks for the fellowship of those who have worshiped in this place, and we pray that all who seek you here may find you, and be filled with your joy and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Most holy God, the source of all good desires, all right judgments, and all just works: Give to us, your servants, that peace which the world cannot give, so that our minds may be fixed on the doing of your will, and that we, being delivered from the fear of all enemies, may live in peace and quietness; through the mercies of Christ Jesus our Savior. **Amen.**

Be our light in the darkness, O Lord, and in your great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of your only Son, our Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**


O God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, Our shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal home:

THE GENERAL THANKSGIVING (Spoken by All)


Almighty God, Father of all mercies,

ABOUT EVENSONG

Evensong is an ancient tradition for the people of God to offer praise and prayer as the day draws to a close. Choral Evensong is a service of sung evening prayer. The text of the service is drawn almost entirely from the Bible. The main purpose is to proclaim the wonderful works of God in human history, and in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Sung psalms and canticles are interwoven with readings from the Old and New Testaments and the recitation of the Apostles' Creed and Lord's Prayer. Other prayers and hymns are drawn from the many centuries of the Christian Church. Typically, the choir offers prayer and praise on behalf of the congregation. However, since today's service honors a church anniversary, this Evensong will include opportunities for congregational participation.

ABOUT OUR CHURCH

The First Baptist Church of Savannah, Georgia, was chartered on November 26, 1800, and soon thereafter the first meeting house was built on Franklin Square. The cornerstone of the present Greek Revival structure on Chippewa Square was laid on February 2, 1831, and the building was completed in 1833. The church was granted a perpetual charter on December 19, 1801, by Governor Josiah Tattnall, Jr., to "the Deacons of the Baptist Church in Savannah." The name has been the First Baptist Church since February 4, 1847. The Sunday School was organized on April 29, 1827. Henry Holcombe, first pastor of the church, edited "The Analytical Repository," said to have been the earliest religious magazine in the South and the first Baptist missionary magazine in the nation. William Bullein Johnson, second pastor, became the first president of the Southern Baptist Convention, after retiring as president of the Triennial Convention. In 1828, Josiah Penfield, a deacon in the church, left a legacy of \$2,500 to the Georgia Baptist Convention, which became the first money given toward the establishment of Mercer University, principal Baptist college of Georgia. The church began ordaining women as deacons as early as the 1970s, and left the Southern Baptist Convention in the early 2000s. The church became welcoming and affirming to the LGBTQ community in 2015.

ABOUT OUR GUEST

A graduate of Cambridge University, Paul Leddington Wright was organ scholar of St. Catharine's College, graduating with a Master's degree in music, studying with Sir David Willcocks and Peter Hurford. Three years work as a Musical Director in the professional theater saw him musically direct the first ever UK tour of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat." His next appointment was as Assistant Organist at Coventry Cathedral and Director of Music at Coventry's Methodist Central Hall. Meanwhile he founded the national Methodist Association of Youth Clubs Orchestra and Singers who performed annually in London's Royal Albert Hall.

From 1984 to 1995 he was Organist and Director of Music at Coventry Cathedral. From 1995 he continued his association with the Cathedral as Associate Director of Music while pursuing a busy career with BBC television and radio as a conductor and arranger. Since 1987, he has conducted over 300 programs in the BBC series, "Songs of Praise." He has been conductor of Coventry Cathedral's choral society, the Saint Michael's Singers, for 26 years and has made over 20 CD recordings with that choir and the BBC Daily Service Singers with whom he regularly broadcasts on BBC Radio 4. He was Artistic Director of the International Church Music Festival from 1991 to 2010. A frequent visitor to the USA, he is in demand as a recitalist, choral clinician and conductor.
